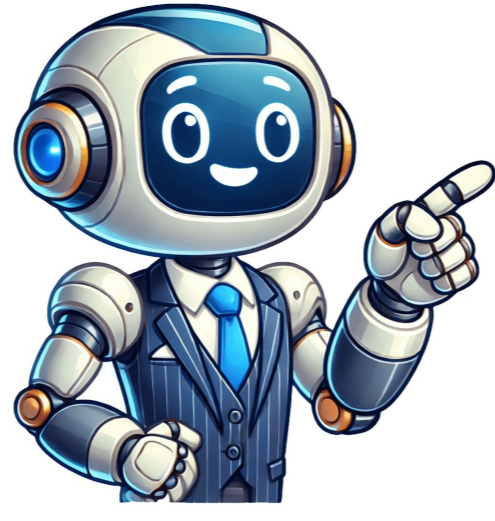

Masters in clinical psychology california

Our mission at UCLA is to foster knowledge that promotes psychological well-being and reduces the burden of mental illness and problems in living, ultimately aiming to develop leading clinical scientists who will have a substantial impact on the field of psychology and the lives of those in need. We strive to cultivate critical thinking, innovation, and discovery among our faculty and graduate students, with a focus on being leaders in their respective fields through research, practice, policy, and education. Guided by values such as collaboration, mutual respect, and fairness, we prioritize diversity and adhere to the highest ethical standards. Our Clinical Psychology program is one of the largest, most selective, and highly regarded programs in the country, aiming to produce future faculty, researchers, and leaders who will make significant contributions to clinical science. The graduate program in clinical psychology at UCLA attracts accomplished scholars who combine expertise in research and practice to drive knowledge development in their field. These academics, empowered by data-driven insights, assume leadership positions that shape the direction of research and service delivery initiatives. The program's tailored supervision approach allows students to navigate various roles, offering a unique blend of flexibility and structure. Within its faculty-driven framework, UCLA offers diverse specializations including child psychopathology, cognitive-behavior therapy, clinical assessment, adult psychopathology, family dynamics, community psychology, stress management, cognitive neuroscience, minority mental health, and health psychology. This concentration enables students to delve deeply into their area of interest while ensuring comprehensive training. The six-year program at UCLA includes a one-year internship that must be completed on campus, with coursework and clinical practicum training woven throughout the curriculum. Clinical supervision is provided by an experienced faculty and guest clinicians from various settings, contributing to a rich and diverse learning environment. Students engage in part-time practicum placements for four and a half years before embarking on their required one-year full-time internship. The UCLA graduate program in clinical psychology has maintained its accreditation since 1949 through the American Psychological Association Commission on Accreditation. Additionally, it holds accreditation from PCSAS (Psychological Clinical Science Accreditation System), which emphasizes science-centered education and training to advance public health and mental well-being. Our clinical psychology program at UCLA is committed to training leaders in mental health research, practice, and policy development. We aim to promote equity and inclusion while adhering to ethical standards. However, we believe that current APA accreditation requirements limit our ability to adapt to evolving scientific evidence and student needs. We are considering not renewing our APA accreditation by 2028, as it aligns better with our core values of advancing scientifically-based training. We will continue to monitor key criteria that impact career prospects for our students. For example, we're working with the Academy of Psychological Clinical Science (APCS) to understand implications for securing predoctoral internships and professional licensure. While we have no direct influence over external organizations, we're excited to shape the training landscape with PCSAS-accredited programs like ours. Our ongoing monitoring of trends in clinical psychology training is encouraging, but evolving circumstances may change our perspective on APA re-accreditation in the future. Given text here The University of California does not control certification requirements and licensure standards set by other agencies or states. Students pursuing licensure in another state must ensure their University of California program meets those requirements. This is due to federal regulations. The UCLA Clinical Psychology Program is designed to prepare students for professional licensure, although not all graduates achieve this goal. More information can be found on the University's website. In the interest of fairness and respect, trainees are expected to provide culturally sensitive services while maintaining the client's best interests. If a conflict arises due to personal beliefs or values limiting service delivery, it must be reported to the Clinic and Placements Committee. The committee will reassign clients if necessary and request a plan from the student to develop competencies. Conflicts between students and faculty can arise but should be addressed through consultation with advisors and department leaders. Students can seek help from campus offices for conflicts and need to address issues within their program and department before seeking outside resolution. Psychologists play a significant role in mental health services, conducting tasks like assessing patients, diagnosing conditions, and providing psychotherapy. The distinction between psychologists and clinical psychologists lies in their focus: psychologists tend to concentrate on research, while clinical psychologists focus on client work. In California, many psychologists require a doctoral degree for certain roles, but some organizations may accept those with a master's degree as preparation for the next step. Institution Overview: - CSU Fullerton offers an MS in Clinical Science program that combines science and applied clinical training. Students prepare to enter a doctoral psychology program or apply for licensure in areas like counseling or therapy. - CSU Northridge provides an MA in Clinical Psychology, offering a well-rounded curriculum with core classes and options for clinical fieldwork experience. - Students can choose between the 37-unit Clinical Research option or the 36-unit Clinical Fieldwork option, with only 12 spots available annually. California Lutheran University, San Francisco State University, Pepperdine University, Notre Dame De Namur University, and California State University Dominguez Hills offer Master of Science or Arts programs in Clinical Psychology that focus on preparing students for a career in the mental health field. ##### - Tuition at California Lutheran University ranges from \$2,743 per semester. - Students can choose between full-time or part-time options, with the program lasting 37-40 credits. - At San Francisco State University, the clinical psychology program involves two years of full-time study and prepares students for either the Marriage and Family Therapy licensing exam or a doctoral degree in psychology. ##### - Tuition at Pepperdine University ranges from \$77,720-\$83,688 per year, with options to complete the program online or on-campus. - The program offers a Marriage and Family Therapy emphasis, and placement specialists will help connect students with local training opportunities. ##### - Tuition at Notre Dame De Namur University ranges from \$998 per unit, totaling 37 units in the program. - Students can choose between an MS in Psychology with a Marriage and Family Therapy emphasis or a Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor emphasis. The program at Vanguard University requires students to complete a supervised clinical practicum of 550 hours, which can be done online or on-campus, and culminates with an exam or thesis. The tuition estimate is \$18,940. This master's degree in clinical psychology prepares students for licensure as a Marriage and Family Therapist or Professional Clinical Counselor in California, or to enter a doctoral program. At Saybrook University, students can choose from various specializations within the MA in Humanistic and Clinical Psychology program, including Psychology, Consciousness, Spirituality, Integrative Health, Creativity Studies, and Existential and Humanistic Psychology. The tuition estimate is \$1,514 per credit. Each program takes 2-3 years to complete. The MA in Clinical/Counseling Psychology at CSU University San Bernardino focuses on practical counseling skills using current research methods. Students will learn how to work with clients in various settings and be prepared for doctoral programs or a career as a Marriage and Family Therapist. The tuition estimate is \$14,352. Earning a California master's degree in clinical psychology can lead to career advancement opportunities and rewarding careers. With these degrees, students can pursue licensure as a Marriage and Family Therapist or Professional Clinical Counselor, providing mental health psychotherapy to individuals and families experiencing struggles. Earning a PhD or PsyD is one of the most prestigious credentials in the mental health field, often accompanied by high salaries. Investing time and resources in this program can be a worthwhile investment, as it equips individuals with a solid foundation for a rewarding career. Fortunately, various opportunities exist to help fund graduate studies in Clinical Psychology. Filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) each year is crucial, as it determines eligibility for federal loans and grants based on household income and other factors. Many universities also offer financial aid directly through their programs, including scholarships and grants. Additionally, online resources like Psychology.org provide access to various scholarship opportunities. Our department will continue monitoring factors influencing career prospects for students completing our doctoral program in clinical psychology from programs accredited only by PCSAS. We're exploring implications on securing top predoctoral internships and licensure eligibility across North America. Although we can't directly control these external organizations, we're excited to work alongside the Academy of Psychological Clinical Science (APCS) and other leaders to shape this evolving landscape. Our tracking of trends in clinical psychology training is encouraging for PCSAS-accredited programs like ours, but changing circumstances may lead us to reconsider seeking APA re-accreditation in the future. In line with transparency and empowering applicants to make informed choices, we're sharing our thoughts on these issues. Our university's programs are designed to prepare students for California licensure and certification requirements, but admission doesn't guarantee licensure or certificate attainment. Licensure and certification standards are set by external agencies that aren't affiliated with the University of California, and these can change anytime. Prospective students planning to pursue licensure or certification outside California must determine whether completing our program meets their state's requirements. Although our program isn't specifically designed for licensure eligibility, the majority of our graduates do become professionally licensed. It is mandatory to submit any concerns to the Clinic and Placements Committee, either directly or via an intermediary like a supervisor or clinical faculty member. The committee will adopt a developmental approach, taking into consideration whether a student has acquired sufficient skills to provide services safely and effectively for clients who might be significantly impacted.
