Looking to start playing songs on the acoustic guitar right away? You can get started by signing up for Ayla's free 6-lesson plan and begin learning with her Beginner Guitar Quick-Start Series. This series is designed specifically for beginners, so you don't need any prior knowledge of the guitar to get started. The lessons cover all the basics, including both acoustic and electric guitars. It's recommended that you start with the first video and follow along through each one in order. The first video will introduce you to the series and teach you how to hold the guitar, read the numbering system, and learn your first few chords. From there, you'll be able to tune your guitar, strum, and even play your very first song. Repeat the process for every string except the second (B) string, where you should tune to the 4th fret of the third (G) string. As you get closer to being in tune, the wobbling sound will slow down and eventually stop. Tuning takes time to develop, so don't be discouraged if it's hard at first. You don't need to move your fingers all around. Some chords have notes in common, like D and Dm. Chords can share similar patterns on different strings too. For example, Am and E. Play Am then lift off, keeping the same shape. Once you know music notation, you can follow more guitar lessons that teach various styles. The 'TAB' lines show the guitar's strings, with the bottom line being the thickest string and the top for the thinnest. Numbers tell you where to press your fingers. When numbers stack up, play those notes together. This example shows a D chord after three single notes. Don't worry about notation for now - start with tab. Most songs involve playing chords, so good strumming is crucial. A great strumming technique will make playing chords easier. The E minor pentatonic scale is the foundation for many guitar solos, used by legendary musicians like David Gilmour and John Frusciante. This scale's simplicity belies its power - it consists of five distinct notes, with the first note repeated at a higher pitch, making six notes in total. The scale's structure, based on the E minor pentatonic scale, is crucial for learning how to play guitar solos effectively. To master this scale and soloing, it's essential to understand that scales are played one note after another, unlike chords which are played simultaneously. The E minor pentatonic scale specifically uses the notes E, G, A, B, and D in a specific order from low to high. When playing lead guitar melodies like the one featured here, precision is key. This requires holding your pick so that only the tip is showing and plucking the string firmly with a downwards motion. It's also important to keep small movements when picking strings, as this allows for more accurate playing and helps prevent unwanted extra movement that can slow you down.
