The State of Georgia created its Inspection and Maintenance program in 1996 to address the Federal Clean-Air Act's requirements. If you need an Emissions test done, select your county and find the nearest location: [insert link] In Georgia, salvaged vehicles must be taken to a state-approved inspection station after repairs have been made and photos of its original condition have been provided along with necessary documents like a completed tag and title application and payment for inspection. Certain vehicles in Georgia are exempt from testing, including those over 8,500 pounds, diesel or alternative fuel vehicles, antique or collector vehicles, and motorcycles. However, hybrid vehicles and bi-fuel vehicles that operate on gasoline must undergo emissions testing even if they're not typically fueled with gasoline. Georgia Senior Exemption is available for vehicle owners aged 65 or older who meet specific criteria like owning a vehicle at least 10 years old, driving less than 5,000 miles annually, and being the primary owner. To apply, applicants need to submit required documents to a Georgia Clean Air Force Customer Service Center or select State of Georgia Tag Offices. Additionally, certain vehicles may have alternative rules for meeting testing requirements based on their mechanical configuration or model year under Georgia's Non-Conforming Status. This includes kit cars, hot rods (which cannot receive this status), and grey market vehicles with model years no later than 1985. Vehicle Emissions Testing Requirements in Georgia For vehicles registered in counties with mandatory emissions testing, owners must ensure compliance to avoid penalties. If a vehicle has obsolete parts, owners can apply for Non-Conforming status. They will need to verify part availability at local salvage yards, shops, and online. However, if the part is found, the Non-Conforming status cannot be granted. Georgia drivers may be eligible for an out-of-area smog check extension if they live outside a reasonable driving distance of the required counties but are within 100 miles of a county seat. However, if they reside in another county and drive into the covered area during testing time, they must still get their vehicle tested. Residency is determined by the proximity to the county seat; drivers living within 100 miles can't obtain an extension. Additionally, residents of counties requiring emissions testing who are out-of-state for school or business purposes must have their vehicles tested. Extensions are valid for one year and require renewal when returning to their county of residence near Atlanta. Emissions inspection certifications from other states cannot be used in Georgia but may serve as proof for obtaining an out-of-area extension. To apply, owners must provide the following documents: \* Completed Out-of-Area Exemption application \* Proof of vehicle ownership (registration, renewal notice, or title) \* Verification of being out of the area (completed documents and supporting information) When requesting an Out-of-Area Extension due to Military Service, you need to provide identifying information and state that you're currently enrolled in classes. This can be done by submitting a copy of your current or original military orders, which must include your identifying information. Alternatively, your commanding officer can write a letter on military letterhead stating that the vehicle owner and vehicle do not reside in the area where you are a resident. Additionally, a valid military ID and a completed extension application must be submitted. To document being Out-of-Area, you can provide one of the following: a Vehicle Inspection Report from another municipality, a traffic citation from the municipality where the vehicle is currently located, a repair receipt from a shop in that municipality, a completed Vehicle Verification Form, or a statement dated within 60 days from a municipal, military, or campus law enforcement organization. The statement must be written on letterhead and include contact information, verifying that the registered vehicle is not in the county where it's registered. If you're an out-of-Area resident in one of Georgia's 13 covered counties during your scheduled testing time other than for work, school, or military service, document the circumstances and send any documentation to [email protected] Georgia also offers Smog Check Waivers. If a vehicle fails its initial inspection, it must be repaired and retested. If it still doesn't pass after a retest, the owner may be eligible for a repair waiver. The state takes into account the age of the vehicle and the emissions components installed when creating its emissions testing standards. Vehicle owners have 30 days to get their vehicle repaired and retested; if they take longer, they must pay the testing fee again. To qualify for a Repair Waiver, your initial inspection must be less than one year old or associated with a previous waiver or registration renewal. Emission-related repairs must meet or exceed an \$855 limit amount. The retested vehicle must show improvement in all areas it failed and pass any areas it passed initially. Repair receipts from each emission-related repair attempt can be considered for a Repair Waiver as long as each receipt is dated 60 days before or after the corresponding failed emissions test. To be eligible for a Repair Waiver in Georgia, the repairs must come from a licensed repair facility. The costs of emission-related repairs, including diagnostic analysis and labor, can contribute to the limit amount. However, if the repairs are done by an unlicensed business, only the part costs will count toward the limit. Repairs and parts must be itemized for consideration. Documents required for a Repair Waiver application include a completed form, scanned copies of previous failed emission tests, original repair receipts with vehicle information, and a copy of the vehicle's registration or title. After completing repairs, a new emissions test is also needed. Georgia Smog Check fees can range from \$15 to \$25 per vehicle, depending on the testing location. It's recommended to get a vehicle emissions test 4-6 weeks before the registration renewal date. Motor vehicles made in 1996 and newer will undergo three tests: OBDII, Gas Cap Seal, and visual Catalytic Converter Inspection. Motor vehicles older than 1995 will receive two-speed idle or ASM2 tests, along with the Gas Cap Seal and Catalytic Converter Inspection. Failed smog inspections often occur due to issues like malfunctioning oxygen sensors, EGR valves, or air filters. If you're moving to one of Georgia's 13 counties near Atlanta, you have 30 days to get your car registered and smog-checked once you arrive. If you're selling a title, the new owner has the same timeframe if they register their vehicle in one of these counties. New cars bought in Georgia are exempt from smog checks for three years, so residents living in these areas don't need to worry about getting a test after buying a new car. However, vehicles over three years old require a smog check before registration in these counties. Sellers aren't required by law to provide buyers with a hard copy of the Vehicle Inspection Report (VIR), but they can get one at the tag office. If you're buying from out of state, you also have 30 days to register and test your vehicle in one of these counties. Before taking the test, ensure that these tasks are completed: \* Check your vehicle's gas cap to ensure it is not damaged and the sealing surfaces are clean for a proper seal. \* If you have a brand new battery, drive your vehicle for a couple of days before scheduling an On-Board Diagnostics (OBD) test to allow the system to reset. \* Regularly check your oil level and change it according to schedule to maintain optimal performance. \* Ensure that your vehicle's tires are inflated with the recommended air pressure and inspect hoses and belts for signs of wear. Replace them as needed. \* Address any mechanical issues with your transmission promptly, as these problems can affect emissions and cause your vehicle to fail the test. The state of Georgia mandates Smog checks for vehicles registered in Fulton, DeKalb, Gwinnett, Cobb, Cherokee, Clayton, and Fayette counties surrounding Atlanta, with testing locations available in these areas, such as Gwinnett County and Cobb County. In order to register your vehicle and claim the title, you must obtain auto insurance from a licensed provider.
